Foundation Principles

WITHOUT GOD

At the opening of the final round of the 2011 U.S. Open Golf championship, NBC, trying to capture the patriotism of the moment, aired a clip of children reciting the pledge of allegiance. It was obvious to all watching the event that something was amissthey had left out the phrase "under God." Whether this was intentional or an unfortunate oversight, I know not, however, it shows there has been a paradigm shift in American culture concerning God. According to a Gallup poll conducted in May of 2010, three out of ten people now say, "Religion is out of date." What a sad turn of events in the mindset of this country. Without God there are many sad tragedies. Let us consider a few.

Without God We Have No Standard of Morality

Despite the spin produced by the liberal talking heads, without God in our lives there is no standard of morality. Man never has been, nor will he ever be, capable of determining what is right for society. Many years ago a record was put on paper to remind us of a dark and desperate time. Judges 21:15 states, "In those days there was no king in Israel: every man did that which was right in his own eyes." What a gloomy picture of a time where each did what was right in his own eyes instead of following the truth established upon God's will. Such situations have spawned the evils of moral relativism or situation ethics. These practices and theological principles have been developed within the mind of man; from a humanistic worldview that excludes God. The guidelines produced from such trends know no boundaries. The advocates of this worldview teach it is impossible to determine what is right or wrong-each individual must decide for themselves in each situation what is acceptable. Jesus, however, clearly identifies the standard

of absolute truth that applies to all humanity: "Sanctify them through thy truth: thy word is truth" (Jn. 17:17). Jesus knew the reality of preaching to a sinful world. Many would not heed what was right, thus He prays for His disciples to be sanctified through truth. The psalmist wrote, "Thou art near, O LORD; and all thy commandments are truth" (Psa. 119:151).

Jesus uttered one of the most controversial statements of history, yet one on which all absolute truth rests, when He said: "...I am the way, the truth, and the life: no man cometh unto the Father, but by me" (Jn. 14:6). Thayer defines "truth" as, "the truth, as taught in the Christian religion, respecting God and the execution of His purposes through Christ, and respecting the duties of man." He goes on to remark, "Opposed alike to the superstitions of the Gentiles and the inventions of the Jews, and to the corrupt opinions and precepts of false teachers even among Christians." Jesus does not merely point to the truth, or a truth, HE IS the truth! Thus truth is universal and absolute. The Hebrew author remarks, "Jesus Christ the same yesterday, and to day, and for ever" (13:8). We understand by this that truth is not the invention of man, nor is it everchanging. Truth is rooted in the nature and being of God. Without God truth does not exist.

Without God We Have No Savior

We are unable to save ourselves. With the rise of modern evolutionary theory the minds of many are deceived, but the fact remains that we cannot save ourselves. We need a Redeemer! Jeremiah wrote. "O LORD, I know that the way of man is not in himself: it is not in man that walketh to direct his steps" (10:23). Isaiah eloquently portrays man's condition without God: "But we are all as an unclean thing, and all our righteousnesses are as filthy rags; and we all do fade as a leaf, and our iniquities, like the wind, have taken us away" (Isa 64:6).

THE SHELLFISH ARGUMENT

In November of 2008, the voting public in the state of California passed Proposition 8 that simply defines marriage in California as a union between a man and a woman. The passing of the proposition sparked public outrage from the same-sex marriage activists, who stormed services at churches and temples, vandalized church properties, harassed elderly people, and threatened to retaliate against anyone who supported the proposition. Of course, all of this was done in the name of "tolerance," "love," and "mutual understanding."

Subsequently, Marc Shaiman, one of the creative minds behind the popular musical "Hairspray," put together an on-line video called "Prop 8: The Musical," lampooning the supporters of the constitutional amendment. The video boasts an all-star cast that includes Jack Black (who plays the role of Jesus), Neil Patrick Harris, and John C. Reilly, and it immediately went "viral" on the Internet.

The strategy behind this shaming-of-the-public production is simple: embarrass the supporters of the amendment so much that the next time same-sex marriage shows up on the ballot they will do the "loving" thing and support it rather than reject it

The telling point in the skit comes when Jack Black (playing Jesus) confronts the "Yes on 8" supporters for their belief that homosexuality is an abomination, lifts a shrimp cocktail to them, and says, "Leviticus also says eating shellfish likewise is an abomination." He goes on to give an erroneous list of other things that are supposedly condemned in the Book of Leviticus. His point being, that if it is wrong to engage in homosexual activity because it is condemned in Leviticus, it is wrong to eat shrimp cocktail for the same reason. He knows, of course, few Christians would condemn eating shrimp.

There has been tension between the theater and Christianity for years. A review of the stage production of "The Screwtape Letters" by an actor

Question: Would you please discuss a situation where the treasurer of a church embezzles some of the money? How often does this occur, and what steps should be taken to prevent it?

Answer: The obligation of counting the money collected on the first day of the week (ICorinthians 16:1-2) and properly depositing it in the bank is one of serious responsibility. I have no way of knowing how many have failed in their responsibility in this matter, but I do know that it has happened on a number of occasions. In some instances the individual simply planned to "borrow" the money for a time and then repay it. Unfortunately the "borrowing" got out of hand and continued until the person involved was unable to repay what was owed. Later the church discovered the problem and serious consequences followed. In Acts 6 when a complaint arose against the Hebrews because the widows of the Hellenists were neglected in the daily distribution, we are told that the twelve summoned the multitude of the disciples and told them to "seek out from among you seven men of good reputation, full of the Holy Spirit and wisdom, whom we may appoint over this business." Note that the men were to be "of good reputation" and "of wisdom." That is, they were to be of high character, men of honesty and integrity. When a congregation selects a man to care for the money contributed on Lord's Day, he should be of unquestionable character. Unfortunately even good men sometime make mistakes and do things we never thought they would do. When this happens, the situation must be addressed. This is not a matter that can be overlooked or condoned. In the view of this writer the individual should be expected to repay the money. It may be that payments will need to be spread out over a time period in order for this to be accomplished, however, to overlook such a serious matter would send the wrong message to all concerned. Repentance in such a case would surely involve restitution. As in most situations, prevention is the best policy. If money is never taken then there will be no need for restitution. That being the case, what steps should be taken to prevent such a thing from happening? I offer the following suggestions: (1) always select at least two men to count the money that is contributed. (Because of the seriousness of the situation children should not be involved in counting the contribution.) (2) Have at least two men, if possible, sign all the checks that are written. (This

may take extra time and effort, but it will pay off in the long run.) 3. A monthly report of all monies taken in and disbursed should be posted in a place or in some way made available so that all local members can read and be advised of how the money is being spent, and how much is on hand in the bank. There are, I'm sure, situations where the preceding steps are deemed unnecessary. In fact in some situations where money came up missing those in charge felt steps like the preceding were unnecessary. However what happened later made them wish they had been more careful in dealing with the Lord's money. Remember when one embezzles from the church, they are actually taking money from the Lord.

BUILDING A CHRISTIAN HOME

Family worship is as old as the family itself. Noah and his family stepped from the Ark and built an altar, and worshipped God (Gen. 8:20). Think of the multiplied instances in which God has made use of the home places which were consecrated to Him: Abraham and his wanderings (Gen. 12 and 13 chapters), is replete with the recurring phrase, "and he built there an altar unto Jehovah."

There is intrinsic beauty in the study of our first human home at its daily worship hour. In that perfect relationship with the Creator there was a period in "the cool of the day" when the family were in fellowship with God. During that pause in the evening, before the long rest at night they had learned to anticipate the sound of His voice while "walking in the garden."

Lydia's house (Acts 16), enabled her to give her timely invitation to Paul and Silas, "come into my house and abide there." Aquilla and Priscilla turned their house into a place of meeting for the church (I Cor. 16:19). Mark's home, alive at midnight with praying disciples was ready to receive Peter from his prison deliverance (Acts 12). The "upper room" of a disciple sheltered the last passover that our Lord ate with His disciples, and was the place where the Lord's Supper was first instituted. To say nothing of the home of Mary and Martha, Zacchaeus, of Peter, and hordes of others mentioned in the Bible as well as the influence of many homes on down through the ages which have helped to shape and mold the lives of great characters

- both statesmen and religionists.

The memories of the old home place with all that went to fill them have held straight the lives of many youths when footloose in the world at large. Home places of great men are preserved and displayed with interest as having a significant bearing on the character of the men. Not often do we see pointed out to us the homestead of a noted criminal. The reason may be that few of them had the advantage of such a place. Religious homes do not lend themselves to the breeding of criminals.

Christian parents should see to it that religion has the first place in their homes. Some of the best and earliest impressions can be made upon the child by his parents living Christianity in the daily home life.

Where God's word is read and obeyed in the daily home life, the child is made to see the beauty and benefits of it constantly, and learns to appreciate it because it causes him to have a more truthful father and mother than the parents of his playmates who are worldly; he sees that they treat each other better; that his home is more congenial and thus, like young Timothy, the faith is imbedded in him in his tender years.

Regardless of how much religion we may display at church, if we do not practice it at home it will not have the proper influence upon our children. We cannot be hypocrites before them; they know us too well. What we are when we get out into the wider circles of the work of the church service depends on what we are in the intimacy of our own homes. One who cannot lead the prayer in the quiet of his own home, usually does a poor job of trying to lead a public prayer. When Jesus had cast the devils out of the poor, benighted soul, He told him "Go home to thy friends, and tell them how great things the Lord hath done for thee, and hath had compassion on thee" (Mark 5:19). Thus He lays down a principle showing that it would not be in accord with the principles of Christianity to allow this man to accompany him to some foreign field while his home folk knew nothing about the Christ. And I believe today that the Lord expects us to first exert our influence at home. I have always been made to wonder about the preacher who wielded such an influence away from home while his children were not even members of the church. And I have always felt that the brother who could sit on the street corner all day and argue scripture - not knowing what kind of mischief his children were in, would do better to do some of that teaching at home.

I believe that family worship will go as far as anything in the world in giving religion a place in the home -and -causing children to realize that father and mother reverence God, appreciate His goodness and depend upon Him for their blessings. Every Christian home should have at least one hour set apart for this worship in which all the family can participate. We found in rearing our children that a good time for this was soon after the evening meal, and before the children get too sleepy. Some prefer to have the worship around the breakfast table. One of the most impressive of these services I ever took part in was around the breakfast table of Brother Alfred Ellmore, when I was a boy.

A song or two that the children can help sing makes the worship more realistic; a chapter read by father or mother or by one of the children, with any one asking questions or offering comments on the lesson; then all, both young and old, kneeling down should go to God in prayer. Here the children will learn the lessons of life and duty, and they will learn to read aloud the word of God, and learn how to pray and sing.

May we all have more religion in our homes.

THE CHURCH AT CORINTH

Whether we like it or not God has chosen what man may call and has called peculiar things in his scheme of redemption. He has made choices for us in religion and he expects these choices to be honored today though he made these choices almost 2000 years ago. God had to make these choices for man because man with their vaunted philosophers could not come up with a scheme that would take man from earth to heaven. These wise men in their day could not come up with a plan that would forgive any man, be he great or small, that would bring about forgiveness of a single sin much less forgiveness for a life time of sin. But God could and did. Not many liked all of God's choices but a few did. Some of God's choices are described in these verses.

1 Corinthians 1:27, But God hath chosen the foolish things of the world to confound the wise; and God hath chosen the weak things of the world to confound the things which are mighty;

For his scheme of redemption God selected, picked out, or chose the Savior of the world who, when born among men in a lowly manger and into a family that men may have considered of low esteem and ended up dying on a Roman cross, to many, a shameful death. It

is evident (vv 18, 23) that the Jews stumbled at this fact and the Gentiles considered it foolishness that such a man could be the Messiah, the Christ. God did this to put all who rejected this choice of God to shame. This seems to be the meaning of "confound." The Jews had no excuse because in their writings they could read how God chose a strategy that seemed weak and foolish to bring down the walls of Jericho. No worldly wise general would have chosen the strategy God chose, Jeremiah 6:1-25. However, to those who let the words of God enlighten their minds it was the thing to do. So they marched around the walls of Jericho one time each day in a certain order for six days. Then on the seventh day they marched around those same walls seven times. The trumpets blew and the people shouted and "the walls came tumbling down." Do not be ashamed of the simple things God has chosen. Stand fast in the faith.

1:28, And base things of the world, and things which are despised, hath God chosen, yea, and things which are not, to bring to nought things that are:

God has chosen things with these characteristics also. Thayer defines "base things" as those among men who are held of no account. This is in contrast with "noble" in v26 who are the "well born" and who are of higher rank by virtue of their birth. When Jesus chose his apostles and they began to go out into the world this description generally characterized them in the eyes of the world. What and who God chose as his ambassadors were often "despised" by the world. And this caused some to reject their message. So far as the world was concerned their rank in life made their message void and caused the message to have no effect in their lives. But God is not finished with this thought. He also chose things or persons who "are not." God chose men to carry his soul saving message to the lost that the philosophers and the nobles considered as "nobodies." In reality they were considered as "dead" (as far as society was concerned) and therefore not capable of doing such important work. But in the sight of God those he chose that society considered less than nothing were his instruments to show that philosophers, noblemen, and the wise men were less than nothing when it came to providing salvation to a lost and dying world.

1:29, That no flesh should glory in his presence.

God wanted the wisest and most sophisticated of men to know they had not and could not come up with a plan that could save a single soul from his past sins, start him on the path that leads him toward heaven, provide him with a resurrection from the dead, and give him a new and different kind of body that could live in heaven in eternity. Not one single man or company of men had the power to accomplish such things and guarantee it would all come to pass. But God could and did. No man can boast of such knowledge and power on his own in this area. It had to come from heaven and the mind of God, 2:10. No human being on his own can expect to stand in the presence of Jesus Christ, the judge of all men, and say, "Here I am and I thought it all up about how to be saved and I lived a good life so now give me my crown that I have earned." Paul in Philippians 2:10-11 tells us exactly what such a man would do in circumstances like that: "That at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, of things in heaven, and things in earth, and things under the earth; And that every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father." This action will happen so it is best for every one to humble themselves before Jesus and confess his name to glorify God now. You can do that in joy now, but before the judgment bar it will be to your shame. Glorifying God is the chief purpose for us in this life. John wrote, Revelation 1:5-6, "And from Jesus Christ, who is the faithful witness, and the first begotten of the dead, and the prince of the kings of the earth. Unto him that loved us, and washed us from our sins in his own blood, 6 And hath made us kings and priests unto God and his Father; to him be glory and dominion for ever and ever. Amen." God gave us an example in Leviticus 10:3,"Then Moses said unto Aaron, This is it that the Lord spake, saying, I will be sanctified in them that come nigh me, and before all the people I will be glorified. And Aaron held his peace." What had happened and why did Aaron hold his peace? Aaron's two sons, Nadab and Abihu had offered strange fire, that God had not commanded. Fire went out from God and devoured them and they died. Aaron was agitated because, I suppose, he had just lost two sons. But when Moses explained what God required of those who came near him and that he was to be glorified when the priests appeared before the people, Aaron held his peace. Aaron's son did not give God the honor and glory he deserved because they offered something not commanded. Aaron now understood, at least for a while, how serious God is about what he has chosen. I think God is still that serious today about choices he has made because he has chosen these choices so man can manifest glory to God by his honoring these choices. Some people sneer at us for not using the modern day Sunday School method of arranging members into classes for the purpose of teaching the Bible. I just opened my encyclopedia and it tells us this about the Sunday Schools founder: "Raikes, Robert (1735-1811), an English publisher, first developed Sunday Schools on an extensive scale." Wouldn't it have been wonderful if they could have written, "God developed Sunday Schools..." But they could not do it because God did not develop The Sunday Schools. Robert Raikes developed the system and therefore receives the glory. Various religions have taken to that system. But it never was God's choice. Remember and accept what God had chosen and bring glory to him.

It is God's desire for all to seek and find salvation. Paul wrote emphatically of this truth about God in 1 Timothy 2:4: "Who will have all men to be saved, and to come unto the "knowledge of the truth." God, in His infinite wisdom, developed a great scheme of redemption. He sent His Son to live a perfect life, as a Lamb without spot, guilty of no sin. The very mission of Jesus was to save and redeem humanity, Matthew records, "...thou shalt call his name Jesus: for he shall save his people from their sins" (1:21). John the Baptizer declared, "Behold the Lamb of God, which taketh away the sin of the world" (Jn. 1:29). Though an esteemed apostle of Jesus Christ, Paul wrote, "This is a faithful saying, and worthy of all acceptation, that Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners; of whom I am chief' (1 Tim. 1:5).

Through the death, burial and resurrection of Jesus Christ, God would proclaim His means of salvation (Rom. 1:16). Paul wrote the Corinthians to remind them of "...the gospel which I preached unto you, which also ye have received, and wherein ye stand; by which also ye are saved..." (1 Cor. 15:1-2). The glorious gospel of Jesus Christ is the means by which salvation can be realized in the act of baptism. Paul explained obedience to the gospel in the Roman epistle, "Know ye not, that so many of us as were baptized into Jesus Christ were baptized into his death? Therefore we are buried with him by baptism into death: that like as Christ was raised up from the dead by the glory of the Father, even so we also should walk in newness of life. For if we have been planted together in the likeness of his death, we shall be also in the likeness of his resurrection: Knowing this, that our old man is crucified with him, that the body of sin might be destroyed, that henceforth we should not serve sin" (6:3-6).

Baptism, the act of obeying the gospel depicting a likeness of the death, burial and resurrection of the Lord Jesus, is the manner in which one comes in contact with His cleansing blood. This is why Jesus proclaimed, "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved; but he that believeth not shall be damned" (Mk. 16:16). Peter proclaimed, "...Repent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins..." (Act 2:38). Without God salvation is unattainable.

Without God We Have No Joy

God gives joy! No true joy and satisfaction will be found without God. Solomon, a man well educated through personal experience and divine guidance teaches, "For God giveth to a man that is good in his sight wisdom, and knowledge, and joy: but to the sinner he giveth travail, to gather and to heap up, that he may give to him that is good before God. This also is vanity and vexation of spirit" (Eccl. 2:26). Two categories of people are found within this timeless teaching: the righteous and the unrighteous. The righteous who live in accordance with God's will find joy, but the unrighteous only encounter only travail. As Solomon composed a majority of the Proverbs a number of passages give lengthy description to the same principle: serve God and find knowledge, wisdom and joy; but the mocker only encounters misery.

Great joy is found in the realization of salvation. As previously discussed, without God we have no salvation. Habakkuk said, "Yet I will rejoice in the LORD, I will joy in the God of my salvation" (3:18). Paul discusses the same principle in the New Covenant, "And not only so, but we also joy in God through our Lord Jesus Christ, by whom we have now received the atonement" (Rom. 5:11). In this life there is no greater joy than finding the forgiveness of sins and having the hope of eternal life.

The greatest joy of all is yet to come-to be found faithful at the Lord's return. In their woeful misunderstanding concerning the Second Coming, Paul wrote to the Thessalonians, "For what is our hope, or joy, or crown of rejoicing? Are not even ye in the presence of our Lord Jesus Christ at his coming?" (1 Thess. 2:19). They will stand as evidence for Paul's joy at the time Christ comes back. Their faithfulness would prove his life was not wasted but something everlasting was accomplished. No greater joy will be found in our lives than to meet the Lord when He gathers His own.

who describes himself and his gay companion as "post-college twentysomethings," says, "Perhaps the most overwhelmingly alienating part of 'The Screwtape Letters'...is the play's strong identification with Christianity. Among many of my peers, Christianity is something for bible-thumpers and right-wing conservatives-something we are predisposed to mock rather than venerate. In the sketch comedy world, where I work frequently, sketches featuring Jesus Christ are so common they are cliché."

Because of such long-standing hostility toward Christianity by much of the theater world, I did not pay much attention to Shaiman's video at first. I assumed the video would remain just another inside joke within that crowd. The message, however, seems to have caught on with the entire gay community and has now become its stock argument.

Randy Roberts Potts, homosexual grandson of the late television evangelist Oral Roberts, served last year as the Grand Marshall of the "AIDS Walk of Oklahoma City." In an interview with the Oklahoman (Oct. 8, 2011) he lamented the fact that his grandfather would not endorse his lifestyle and argued that if the Bible condemns homosexual activity, it also condemns eating shrimp cocktail.

Gay radical Dan Savage makes the same argument repeatedly. He calls the religious world hypocritical because it endorses Leviticus' condemnation of homosexual activity as being an abomination while ignoring all the other prohibitions in Leviticus, including the one against eating shellfish.

The shellfish argument, however, is a failure to divide rightly the word of truth (2 Tim. 2:15), whether it is done ignorantly or intentionally.

The teachings in Leviticus were a part of the Law of Moses and were binding only upon the Jews until the Law was fulfilled by Christ (Mt. 5:17). These teachings were primarily for the priests and Levites who were in charge of the sanctuary and who ministered to God on behalf of the people of Israel. The whole point of these teachings was to teach Israel how to separate and become distinct from all they had learned while in Egyptian captivity. Leviticus is a book about contrast and separation, distinctions and differences. Everything in the

life of the Old Testament Jew was either "holy" (set apart for God's exclusive use) or "common." Common things were either "clean" (the people could use them) or "unclean" (the people were forbidden to use them), and shellfish is among the many dietary items forbidden as being unclean (Lev. 11:9-12). The Jews had to be careful to avoid what was unclean or they would be cut off from the people until they could cleanse themselves again ceremonially.

All of the many, complex laws regulating the daily lives of the Jews were reminders that God's people could not live any way they pleased. They had to learn the difference between holy and unholy, and between clean and unclean (Lev. 10:10). They could not live like the godless nations around them.

The apostle Paul explains, however, that the entire Law of Moses, including the commandments written on stones (2 Cor. 3:7), was taken out of the way, nailed to the cross, and is no longer in force upon God's people in any of its parts today (Col. 2:14-17).

It follows, therefore, that the dietary prohibitions under the Law of Moses, including the prohibition against eating shellfish, are no longer binding today. This truth is made clear by the Lord and both apostles Paul and Peter (Mk. 7:15; Col. 2:14-17; Acts 10:11-16).

While some of the things declared to be sinful in the Old Testament are not sinful in the New Testament, there are a number of prohibitions from the Old Testament that have been reenacted in the New Testament. Among other things it is still wrong to steal, kill, commit adultery, and covet. The reason these activities are condemned today is not because they were a part of the original 10 Commandments, but because they have been reenacted under the New Testament which has been ratified by the blood of Christ (Rom. 12:9; Heb. 9:15-18; Mt. 26:28).

The same is true of homosexual activity. We do not condemn it today because it was condemned in Leviticus in the Old Testament Law of Moses, but we condemn it today because it is condemned in the New Testament of Jesus Christ (Rom. 1:26-32; 1 Cor. 6:9; Col. 3:5). In fact, homosexual activity is so reprehensible to God that He has condemned it in every dispensation of time since the beginning: Patriarchal, (Gen. 19; Jude 7); Mosaic (Lev. 18:22); and Christian (Rom. 1:26-32).

Obviously, the shellfish argument is based upon a faulty premise. One can enjoy eating shrimp, lobster, and any other kind of shellfish today, because the prohibitions against it in the Old Testament ended at the cross and were not reenacted in the New Testament. Homosexual activity remains a sin today, however, because the prohibitions enacted against it in the Patriarchal and Mosaic ages have been reenacted in the age of Christianity.

Paul warns that when people guilty of such sins demonstrate they do not want the truth, and are not going to accept the truth, God will give "them over to a reprobate (debased) mind to do those things which are not convenient (not proper or decent, but loathsome)" (Rom. 1:28). It is tragic, but his words seem to describe accurately the same-sex marriage activists of today. cmjthebackpage@gmail.com

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THE BACK PAGE. . .

A LEG, FALSE TEETH, AND A TABLE

Union commander Major General Daniel Sickles was one of the most colorful characters to participate in the famous battle at Gettysburg during the Civil War. He was a controversial figure even before the Civil War began. In 1859 he was elected to the US Congress from a New York district. While in Washington Sickles learned his wife Teresa was having an affair with a brilliant young attorney, Philip Barton Key, the son of Francis Scott Key, composer of the lyrics to the "Star Spangled Banner." Philip Key was not only a well-known attorney in Washington D.C., he was the district attorney, the chief prosecutor of the nation's capital. When Sickles saw Key outside his home in Lafayette Park, directly across from the White House, he became enraged and shouted, "Key, you scoundrel, you have dishonored my bed-you must die!" In broad daylight Sickles shot Key twice at point-blank range and killed him.

Sickles was arrested and charged with murder, but he pleaded temporary insanity-one of the first persons ever to make such a pleaand was acquitted!

Subsequently, Sickles was made commander of the Union Army's 3rd Corps. During the Battle of Gettysburg, he made some tactical decisions that were questionable at best and historians continue to debate the merits of his contributions during the conflict. One thing is certain, however, he was fearless in the heat of battle and his men loved him. As the Confederates overran the Peach Orchard during the second day at Gettysburg, Sickles was sitting atop his horse near a barn. He was observing his troops when a Confederate artillery round struck him in the right leg, nearly tearing it off. After having a tourniquet applied to his leg to control the bleeding, the still-conscious Sickles calmly lit a cigar and gave orders to his troops until he was finally carried away on a stretcher. Later, a Union surgeon amputated his leg.

Curiously, of all the monuments in Gettysburg National Park today there is no monument commemorating the heroics of Sickles. There is one commemorating the New York brigade he commanded, but none that mentions Sickles by name.

Maybe Sickles anticipated such an oversight because when his leg was amputated at Gettysburg he had it sent to Washington D.C. where it was put on display in the National Museum of Health and Medicine. Sickles amputated leg was the only monument on display commemorating his participation at Gettysburg and he often visited the leg for many years after the battle.

Phyllis and I recently spent 3 days in Gettysburg and then joined my brother Benny and his wife Sondra for 5 days in Washington D.C. We examined the artifacts left behind by the people who made great contributions to our country and the monuments erected to commemorate those contributions. We saw everything from George Washington's false teeth to the Washington Monument.

The greatest memorial we saw during our visit, however, was the one we saw in Rockville, Maryland, on the Lord's Day, June 17th We met with the Rockville brethren for worship and found the Lord's Table set just as it is described in Scripture. On the Lord's Table we found one undivided loaf of unleavened bread and a cup that contained unfermented fruit of the vine, or grape juice (Mt. 26:28; Mk. 14:22-25; Lk. 22:19-20: 1 Cor. 10:16-17; 1 Cor. 11:23-29).

While this memorial is not as grandiose as the Washington Monument or as bizarre as Sickles' leg, it is the one we approached with the greatest reverence and appreciation because it commemorates the greatest event in human history. It commemorates the death of Christ who willingly sacrificed His blood to make possible the forgiveness of our sins here and to give us the hope of a home in heaven in the hereafter.

Furthermore, the elements on the Lord's Table are not mere relics left behind by a dead man, such as Washington's teeth or Sickles' leg, because Jesus Christ is still very much alive! We do not worship a dead, historical Jesus. We worship a risen Savior (Mk. 16:6), and when we participate in the Lord's Supper, we "commune" with Him (1 Cor. 10:16).

Both my sons called me that same day (June 17) to wish me a happy Father's Day. The brief time I spent "communing" with each of them over the phone lifted my spirits and warmed my heart. Similarly, when we partake of the bread and the cup, we commune with one another, but we also commune with the Lord. We are reminded that His blood frees us from the shackles of sin (Mt. 26:28), that He abides with us still (Mt. 28:20), and that soon He shall return to take us home with Him (1 Cor. 11:26; Jn. 14:1-3). Such communion should flood our hearts with gratitude and renew our strength to carry on.

Sickles' leg is indeed a bizarre memorial and the universally-recognized Washington Monument is spectacular, but the Lord's Table remains the greatest memorial in the history of the world. cmjthebackpage@gmail.com
