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THREE RULES OF LIFE

The greatest sermon ever preached was preached by or Lord on the side of a hill near Capernaum. We call it "The Sermon on the Mount". In that sermon, Jesus gave what men have designated as "The Golden Rule". We often quote it like this: "Do unto others as you would have them do unto you". It's found in Matthew 7:12.

There are two other rules that have been given metallic names, the "Iron Rule" and the "Silver Rule". Men have been following these rules to one degree or another down through the centuries. The Iron Rule has to do with power and force. Its motto is "Might Makes Right". Those who practice this rule believe that the person with the power has the right to do to the powerless as he pleases. The Babylonians followed this rule. Their motto was "My god is my might" (Habakkuk 1:11). They worshiped at the shrine of power and might. Cain was probably the first one to practice this philosophy when he killed his brother Abel - because "his works were evil" (I John 3:11-12) and because he had the power to do so. Military leaders like Alexander the Great and Julius Caesar were iron-rule men. They ruled the world by this rule. Even Charles Darwin gave scientific respectability to the Iron Rule as he promoted the "survival of the fittest". His was the law of the jungle - the strong survive while the weak are eliminated. Adolf Hitler in his scheme to develop a master race followed Darwin's iron-rule policies by slaughtering millions of Jews. And the rule has even found its way into the government of the United States. As a result of the Roe v. Wade decision by the Supreme Court in 1973, millions of innocent children have been murdered in the abortion clinics of this nation. Many examples could be given of this monstrous rule.

The Silver Rule is little more respectable. Some have called it the negative Golden Rule. It is the Golden Rule without the gold. It says, "What you do not wish done to you, do not do to others." Ancient Greeks and Jewish rabbis subscribed to this rule. Rabbi Hillel said: "What is hateful to yourself, do to no other." Confucius declared, "What you do not wish yourself, do not unto others". The problem with the Silver Rule is that it is totally negative in its emphasis. It forbids much; it enjoins nothing. The Silver Rule was followed by the witnesses to the cruel murder of Catherine Genovese in 1964 in New York City. Thirty-eight people heard her screams, but they did nothing. A long list of rationalizations were given to excuse their silver-rule logic! The Silver Rule is a negative rule. It reasons that we are right because we do no wrong. That won't get you into heaven!

Finally, there is the exalted Golden Rule. Jesus said, "Therefore, whatever you want men to do to you, do also to them, for this is the Law and the Prophets". The Silver Rule will be condemned on Judgment Day when the lost will hear the Lord say: "Depart from Me, you cursed, into the everlasting fire prepared for the devil and his angels" - "for you did it not..." (Matthew 25:41-43). The Golden Rule says to "Do unto others". It is a positive rule of doing. The Silver Rule only requires a person to not harm another. It doesn't say anything about doing good. Although it forbids bad behavior, it doesn't encourage good behavior. The Golden Rule declares that it matters how you treat other people! Christianity is not just a vertical relationship that merely looks upward to God, it is also a horizontal relationship that looks outward to our fellow man. And our vertical relationship depends mightily on the horizontal relationship. We cannot be right with God if we fail to do right by our fellow man.

The Golden Rule applies to all people with whom we come in contact. The word "men" used by Jesus is generic in the Greek - it means people in general. We are to do unto everyone as we would have them do unto us. And we carry this rule into every area of our lives. It applies in our home, our school, and yes, in our business or profession.

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"WHITHER THOU GOEST, I WILL GO"

One of the most important characteristics that should exist in a person is loyalty. In the Old Testament we have a great example of loyalty found in a woman name Ruth. Ruth had an instinctive sense of loyalty to her mother-in-law, Naomi. After the death of her husband she was given the option of staying in her own culture or traveling with her mother-in-law to a distant country of which she knew nothing about. Sensing her place of responsibility was at Naomi's side, Ruth made the journey.

Loyalty ties people together. It was Ruth's tremendous loyalty that God saw and rewarded by placing her in the genealogical line of the Savior of the world.

Ruth made a great sacrifice by leaving her family and friends. She was loyal to Naomi and God. She put aside her own interest and became Naomi's support and dearest friend. She vowed to stay by Naomi's side with her great statement, "whither thou goest, I will go."

We are called upon to show loyalty to Christ and God, Col. 3:15-17. Every Christian is solemnly dedicated to Christ if he is a genuine Christian. Loyalty to Christ and God for the Christian is the first and basic law of life. "Whatsoever ye do in word or deed, do all in the name of the Lord Jesus" must be the motto and guiding star of every faithful child of God. Loyalty to God means obedience.

Jesus had much to say about men's responsibility for obeying God as the basis of man being acceptable in the eyes of God. The New Testament tells us that that obedience is a key that unlocks many doors for us. It is a seed that bears many fruits, it produces many desirable results in the life of the person who diligently pursues the life of obedience.

Jesus tells us in Matthew 7 that, obedience, or loyalty to God is that which gains for us an entrance into the Kingdom of God. Matt. 7:21 "Not everyone that saith unto me, Lord, Lord, shall enter into the kingdom of heaven; but he that doeth the will of my Father which is in heaven". In this same chapter, Jesus tells us that the obedient life is a well-founded life. The man who hears the word and obeys it is compared to a man who builds His house on a good foundation. The man who does not hear and obey, is compared to a man who built on an

unstable foundation.

Obedience is how we escape the slavery of sin. Rom. 6:17-18 "But God be thanked, that ye were the servants of sin, but ye have obeyed from the heart that form of doctrine which was delivered you. Being then made free from sin, ye became the servants of righteousness." Peter states, 1 Peter 1:22 "Seeing ye have purified your souls in obeying the truth through the Spirit unto unfeigned love of the brethren, see that ye love one another with a pure heart fervently:" The writer of Hebrews adds that Jesus, being made "perfect", became the author of eternal salvation unto all them that obey him; Hebrews 5:9. It is by our obedience that we show our love and loyalty to God. Jesus said, "if ye love me, keep my commandments".

The book of Romans speaks of faith and of the "obedience of faith". Coupled with the book of James, it shows us that a man's faith is not something that merely exists in theoretical form. If it is a saving faith, it is a faith that expresses itself by obeying God.

People of all religious persuasions are attempting to obey God in one manner or another. Men in their attempts to obey God, all too often are doing entirely different things in response to the same commandment. This certainly poses a problem and raises the question," Just what is obedience?" What kind of obedience is acceptable unto God? The New Testament gives us some amazingly simple points we should be aware of.

First, we see the obedience that is acceptable to God must come from the heart of man. In Romans 6:17 Paul says "ye have obeyed from the heart." Any obedience that does not come from the heart is not obedience. It certainly is not worthy in the eyes of God.

What is the heart? We reason with the heart; Mark 2:8. The heart can express emotion; Rom. 10:1. The heart can purpose; Acts 11:23. The heart can believe; Rom. 10:10. The heart is that inner part of man that can reason, desire, purpose and believe. It includes the intellect, the emotions, and the will. It is from this fountain that obedience must spring.

Jesus recognized that there was a temptation to honor God with the lips while the heart was far from Him. Jesus indicted the people of His day for such behavior; Matt. 15:8 "This people draweth nigh unto me with their mouth, and honoureth me with their lips; but their heart is far from me."

When Samuel was sent to the house of Jesse to seek for a new king, he thought he had found his man in David's older brother. Samuel was looking on the physical attributes and said, "surely this is the man". God said, "no, look not upon him for I have rejected him" and He went on to tell Samuel that man looks on the outward appearance, but God looks on the heart.

We who would delight in our obedience and loyalty to God, we who possess the truth must never forget that obedience comes from the heart. God may well see what we do outwardly, and we may compliment one another for our outward achievements. We need to remember that God's eyes penetrate beneath the surface to consider the heart of each one who would obey. Acceptable obedience comes from the heart.

Second acceptable obedience involves doing what God has said. No man should dare do anything other than that which the commands of God have set forth. John sounds forth a warning; 2 John 9. The man who would tamper with the word of God and refuses to do what God has asked is a man who has separated himself from God. A man who refuses to obey has put himself in a terrible position.

Some seem to be determined to do that which God has said not to do. Man is often inclined to tell himself if he attaches the right name to what he does, then it is right, Matt 7:22-23. The counterfeiter may put the Secretary of Treasurer's name on his bill but that does not make it the real thing.

There are some who are interested in their own opinions. The classic example of this attitude is Naaman. There are some who like to pick and choose. For some it is like going through a cafeteria line where you choose the items you want. Acceptable obedience involves doing all that God has said.

Third, obedience involves doing what God has said, doing it from the heart, and doing it in the way God has said. All too often we see people attempting to do what God has said, but they do it in the way they choose. Saul was a man like this. He did not follow God's command, yet he still insisted that he obeyed God. Even though he professed noble intentions, he was condemned by God because he did not do exactly as God commanded him to do. How many profess their loyalty to God and Jesus yet do things their own way? We show our loyalty to God by obeying Him.

Today the question for you and me is, where does our loyalty lie? Are we loyal to God and Christ? Are we loyal to the church Jesus died for?

A loyal person remains steadfast to those whom he serves. Loyalty is an expression of love that comes from the heart. A loyal person has a strong sense of responsibility. Loyal people set aside their own interest for the interest of others.

Genuine loyalty is not built on circumstances, environment, popularity, or convenience. Loyalty is built on devotion. Ruth was devoted to Naomi. Are we devoted to God? Does serving God take precedence over everything else? Will we say, "whither thou Goest, I will go." —Rick Martin, teacherrmartin@gmail.com

JESUS CHRIST AND THE CHURCH

The religious groups today are diligent in preaching Jesus. However, they are not in favor of preaching his church. It was recorded in the Book of Genesis about the creation of man. God created Adam from the dust and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life, v. 7. However, God said, it is not good that the man should be alone and said further, He will make him an help meet for him. 2:28. Why is It necessary that the side of Jesus be opened by piercing through a spear? Note the words in Hebrews 10:19-20, "Having therefore, brethren, boldness to enter into the holiest by the blood of Jesus, By a new and living way, which He has consecrated for us, through the veil, that is to say, His flesh" When his flesh was opened, the holiest was opened and there we have a new and living way. What was that thing that was opened for us? In Acts 20:28 it was written, "Take heed therefore unto yourselves, and to all the flock, over the which the Holy Ghost hath made you overseers, to feed the Church of God, which he has purchased with his own blood". When the flesh of Jesus was opened, blood came out and there, the church was purchased. But what about the water? What was it's significance? Look at what the Apostle Paul wrote in Ephesians 5:25-28 "Husbands, love your wives; even as Christ also loved the church, and gave himself for it. That he might sanctify and cleanse it with the washing of water by the word, That he might present unto himself a glorious church, not having a spot or wrinkle, or any such thing: but that it should be holy and without blemish." We understand that Paul was speaking to the church without blemish being washed with water by the word. This refers to water baptism like those who heard the word or the Gospel preached in Jerusalem on the day of Pentecost believed, repented of their sins and baptized for the remission of their sins and thus the establishment of the church of Christ.

We also understand that the church was without blemish as Eve was a pure virgin when she was given to Adam as his wife. The church was at that state when it was espoused to Jesus. The Apostle Paul wrote to the Corinthians 11:2 "For I am jealous over you with godly jealousy: for I have espoused you to one husband: that I may present you as a chaste virgin to Christ" The church was presented to Christ as a chaste virgin to be his wife. Being so, what is her condition? Are they separate? Paul explained in Ephesians 5:22-24 "Wives, submit yourselves unto your own husband, as unto the lord. GIVING THANKS AT THE LORD'S TABLE

It is apparent to many that something needs to be said, and teaching needs to be done with regards to appropriate thanksgiving at the Lord's table (Luke 22:30). After all, Jesus our Lord set the example and said, "This do in remembrance of me" (Luke 22:19). New converts are bound to be confused when they hear thanksgiving offered in so many different ways and often inappropriately. And most of the time a person who makes the mistakes receives no correction, and over and again the same mistakes are made. Often brethren who have received no instruction, either from the pulpit or privately, are asked to serve at the Communion table. Some have never learned correct and appropriate thanksgiving. It is no wonder mistakes are made and the thanksgiving is misworded.

The elements in the Lord's Supper are nothing more than

common bread and grape juice in a common drinking vessel until they are sanctified through prayer and blessed by the Lord. Even our daily food is "sanctified by the word of God and prayer" (1 Tim. 4:4, 5). When Jesus instituted the Communion the Scriptures tell us He blessed the elements. Then He declared, "this is my body", "this is my blood" (Matt. 26:26, 28), "this cup is the New Testament in (ratified by) my blood" (Luke 22:20). Jesus was not telling His apostles that the elements had become literally His body, His blood, and literally the new covenant God made with His people. The word "is" is a copula of "symbolic representation". These elements were symbols of what they represented. (Yes, they are representatives; not literally the body and blood of Christ). They were symbolic only after they were sanctified by thanksgiving of Jesus (set apart for a particular use). They became significant by divine arrangement and recognition. They are of spiritual purpose and value and must be received as such. Otherwise, we eat and drink damnation to ourselves, "not discerning the Lord's body" and are "guilty of the body and blood of the Lord"! Cor. 11:27, 29). This is serious.

When our Lord gave His apostles the Communion, He set the example for them and for us, and He said "This do in remembrance of me" (Luke 22:20). Jesus "took bread, and gave thanks" (Luke 22:19). I have actually witnessed brethren serving at the table who failed to offer thanks. The apostle Paul wrote to the Corinthians "the cup of blessing which we bless" (1 Cor. 10:16). This is fundamental. To follow the example of Jesus we offer thanks. For what? We offer thanks for the elements that comprise the Lord's Supper. After we offer our thanks, the next thing in order is to ask the Lord to "bless or sanctify" the bread; to "sanctify the cup of blessing". When we do this, the bread becomes symbolically the body of Jesus and the cup with its contents becomes symbolically the "cup of the Lord" (1 Cor 11:27).

Our thanksgiving is directed to God through the name of Jesus. But I have heard, more than once, a brother waiting on the table make the error of thanking God for shedding His blood for us. God did not die for us. God sent Jesus to become our sacrifice for sin (John 3: 16). It was Jesus who died on the cross and shed his blood for the remission of sins (Matt. 26:27).

There are brethren who seem to think they have to explain to God the meaning of the elements. They say, "We thank thee for this bread which is the body of Jesus." And again, "We thank thee for this fruit of the

vine which is the blood of Christ, and this cup which is the New Testament." God knows the significance and meaning of the elements. The true meaning of the Communion should be taught to the members of the church before the observance; not in the prayer. We who commune need to understand before we partake, so as to do it without eating and drinking damnation to ourselves.

In 1 Cor. 10:16 the apostle Paul says, "The cup of blessing which we bless, is it not the communion of the blood of Christ? The bread which we break, is it not the communion of the body of Christ?" In this Paul reminds us that we are to give thanks for "the cup of blessing" which is the "communion of the blood of Christ". He also tells us that the bread is the "communion of the body of Christ". He reminds us that this is what we give thanks for. And when the thanks are given and the Lord sanctifies these elements, they have spiritual significance; they have sacred purpose. If we use scriptural language in our thanksgiving, we can't go wrong.

All our prayers are addressed to God. "We give thanks to God and the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ..." says the apostle Paul (Col. 1:3). In giving thanks at the table of the Lord it is appropriate to thank God (1) "for the bread which to us is the communion of the body of Christ" (2) "to ask the Lord to bless (sanctify) it for its intended use or purpose." It is also apropos to solicit his help to partake of it in the right way. There is no reason to embellish the prayer or to lengthen it unnecessarily. It is not a time for a long prayer or flowery speech, or the exercise of a large vocabulary. And when one offers thanks for the cup, he can say, as an example, (1) "We thank thee for this cup of blessing" (which language is scriptural and covers both the container and its contents). (2) "Please bless it for its intended purpose." (3) "Help us to partake of it in the right way and with the right attitude", or words to that effect. And every time we partake, it is for the purpose of reminding us of the greatest sacrifice ever made--the crucifixion of the Son of God and all that He suffered to purchase our redemption and to give the hope of eternal life. It is a memorial service. We do this to show His death till he comes (1 Cor. 11:26).

Let the man who officiates at the "table of the Lord" be absolutely sure to offer prayer that is scriptural and appropriate. For he has an awesome responsibility of wording an acceptable prayer to God for his own benefit and the benefit of the assembled saints, in order for the

observance to be acceptable to the Lord. "This do in remembrance of me" said Jesus.

The Golden Rule was first presented in its purest form by Jesus. Jesus suggested that it was a summary of Old Testament teaching when He said, "This is the law and the prophets." I think he made this plain in Matthew 22:35-40 when He was asked what was the greatest commandment. He replied, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind. This is the first and great commandment. And the second is like it: 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself.' On these two commandments hang all the Law and the Prophets." Herein lies the foundation and full expression of the Golden Rule. If you love God with your total being and your fellow man as yourself, you will do unto others as you would have them do unto you.

We should hasten to say that The Golden Rule is a reasonable rule. Please be aware that the rule does not say, "Whatever others want you to do, do unto them." Many would want you to do wrong and sinful things. No, the rule is practiced by one who is well informed in God's will, and it will always be practiced with a purview of what is right before God.

It is interesting to see that all of these rules are forcefully illustrated in Jesus' parable of the good Samaritan in Luke 10. Jesus said that a certain Hebrew man was traveling the road that led through a barren region from Jerusalem to Jericho. As he journeyed, he fell victim to robbers who tore off his clothes, beat him, and left him half-dead by the roadside. The bandits' reasoning was: "We are several; you are one. We are strong; you are weak. You have possessions; we want them." Theirs was the clenched-fist rule of iron.

As the man lay wounded, unable to help himself, eventually a Jewish priest came by, and then later, a Levite (one who served the priests in temple ceremonies). These were religious leaders of the day. Both were likely horrified by the bloody scene, and so they crossed to the opposite side of the road, and hastened their steps. Their respective thinking doubtless was: "This tragedy was not my fault. It's none of my affair. I can't get involved". They did not kick the afflicted Jew; they did not rifle his pockets. They simply passed on. They were silver-rule men.

Finally, a Samaritan came by. Samaritans were normally dedicated enemies of the Jews. John 4:9 says, "For Jews have no dealings with Samaritans". But the Samaritan did not see a Jew or an enemy. He saw a fellow human being in need and was moved with compassion. He tended the injured man's wounds, set him on his own donkey, and took him to a nearby inn where he paid for his lodging-and pledged even more! The Samaritan's code of ethics was this: "But for the grace of God, I could be writhing in agony by the roadside. What would I desire on my behalf if our respective circumstances were reversed?" It did not take him long to find the answer, for his compassionate heart was bathed in the golden glow of divine love. The Samaritan was following the Golden Rule. And that's the rule we must follow.

It is easy to see that the Golden Rule is the superior rule for us to follow. The Iron Rule is a disastrous rule and will condemn us in the final Day. The Silver Rule is only partially good. It promotes a negative religion that will never get you to heaven. The Golden Rule is true rule of Heaven and a heavenly life.

The Golden Rule is a thrilling challenge to contemplate. I'm sure none of us observes it perfectly, but let us never criticize it. Rather, let us applaud it, and strive for its lofty heights. Nothing could go farther in changing life for the better than to obey the Golden Rule. Whatever your role in life is, consider how it could be improved by simply living the Golden Rule. Look for ways you can help others, and do good for them. "Therefore, as we have opportunity, let us do good to all, especially to those who are of the household of faith" (Galatians 6:10). 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WALKS THROUGH THE BIBLE. . .

HOW CAN YOU HIDE IN BLOOD - AND WHY WOULD YOU WANT TO?

"Being justified freely by His grace through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus, whom God set forth as a propitiation by His blood, through faith, to demonstrate His righteousness, because in His forbearance God had passed over the sins that were previously committed, to demonstrate at the present time His righteousness, that He might be just and the justifier on the one who has faith in Jesus." (Romans 3:24,25) The word propitiation is translated from the Greek word, hilasterion, which is used in only one other passage in the New Testament. In Hebrews 9:5 it is translated "mercy seat" and refers to the golden covering over the ark of the covenant. Interestingly, in the Septuagint, the Greek translation of the Old Testament, this same Greek word is used for the ark that was in the Most Holy Place.

The word propitiation properly means something that expiates, appeases, or satisfies. It originally referred to offering a sacrifice to appease a god who had been offended. In the Old Testament men were instructed to offer sacrifices to satisfy the justice and righteous demands of the true God against whom they had sinned. The only sacrifice that could meet that demand was blood. The word blood is used over 700 times in the Bible and we see a red line that threads its way from Genesis to Revelation. Abel was accepted because he offered an animal whose blood had been shed, while Cain and his sacrifice were rejected. No blood - no propitiation! All the patriarchs built altars and offered up the blood of animals to cover their sins.

When God gave Moses the blueprint for the Tabernacle, the Ark of the Covenant was placed in the Most Holy Place and once a year the High Priest would enter and place blood on the golden Mercy Seat between the golden Cherubim. That blood on the Mercy Seat made atonement for Israel year by year. This is, in part at least, what Paul is referring to in Romans 3:24 when he wrote that God in His forbearance had passed over the sins that were previously committed. The blood of animals, as Paul declares in the Hebrew letter, could not take away sin. The blood on that Mercy Seat was a type of the blood of Jesus. Jesus is the lamb of God slain for the sins of the whole world. The blood of all those animals shed for thousands of years pointed forward to the blood of Jesus, the only true propitiation for sin. The blood of Jesus satisfied the demands of God's justice and demonstrated His righteousness.

While true that the word propitiation conveys the idea of appeasement and expiation, obviously the word also carries the idea of a covering. The Mercy Seat covered the ark which contained the tablets upon which God had written His law. It was a broken law broken by the sin of the children of Israel. That broken law, and their sins, had to be covered if they were to escape the judgment of God. But blood is the only thing that can cover sin, therefore every year on the Day of Atonement blood was placed on the Mercy Seat. Jesus shed his blood and then, once and for all time, covered the sins of all those who believe and obey Him. God is satisfied. The demands of justice, and the desire for mercy, all met on Calvary. Our sins are covered. Praise the Lord! It is as if we and our sins are hidden in the blood of the Lord.

My grandson Sam is 16 years old. When he was 5 years old the song, "Hide You In The Blood" was sung at church one Sunday morning. On the way home he asked Leah, his mom, "Mom, how can you hide in blood- and why would you want to?" Children are very literal and he could not understand the idea of hiding in blood. Leah tried to explain it to him but how do you explain hiding in blood to a 5 year old? Finally she just told him he would understand when he got older, which of course now he does. We understand too. It is really an awesome thought that we can hide behind the cross, as the old preachers used to say, and in a sense hide in the blood of the Son of God, a lamb without blemish, shed for our redemption and eternal salvation.

Come from the loathsome way of sin, Hide you in the blood of Jesus;

Come for the Lord will take you in, Hide you in the blood of Jesus.

Come, there is safety in the blood, Hide you in the blood of Jesus;

Now plunge beneath the crimson flood, Hide you in the blood of Jesus.

Come now believing in the Lord, Hide you in the blood of Jesus;

Trusting His grace and precious word, Hide you in the blood of Jesus.

O hide you in the blood, For the storms are raging high,

O hide you in the blood, Till the dangers pass you by.
